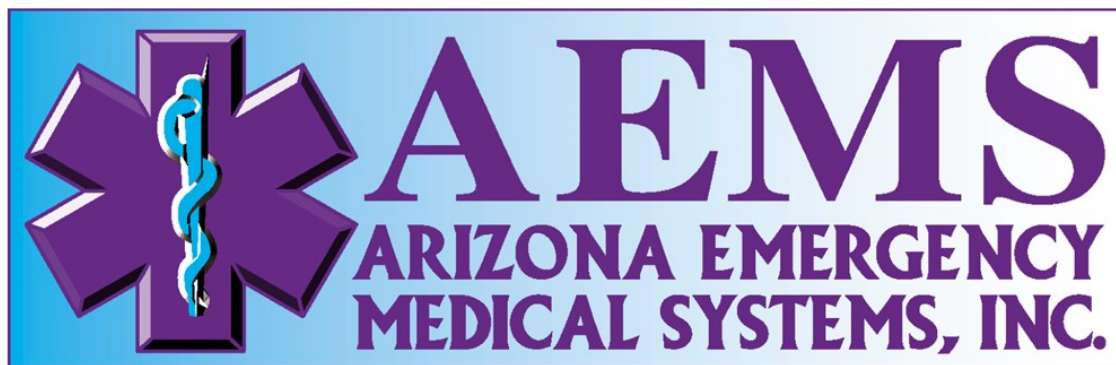

## ABOUT AEMS

Arizona Emergency Medical Systems, Inc. (AEMS), a 501(c)(3) non-profit, is a community-based volunteer organization dedicated to enhancing emergency medical services (EMS) and trauma care for the Central Arizona Region (which includes Maricopa, Gila, and Pinal counties).

Since 1975, AEMS has facilitated the collaboration of physicians, nurses, EMTs, paramedics, and hospital administrators to ensure that emergency medical care is delivered in a coordinated manner, and moreover, that it is meeting the needs of the public.

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## MISSION

AEMS shall facilitate continuous improvement of the diverse components of Emergency Medical Services for the Central Arizona Region, through an inclusive, collaborative, patient-focused, and comprehensive approach, to meet the changing needs of the System and the community.

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## SUPPORTING SERVICES

**Management** As a non-profit organization, AEMS is managed by an active, volunteer Board of Governors and Executive Committee. The AEMS Board is unique because it is composed of representative from all levels of EMS and pre-hospital. Additionally, most of the individuals whom serve on the Board are professionally impacted by AEMS' mission. The Executive Director is the only paid staff person who works in conjunction with the Board and Executive Committee to manage, coordinate, and implement the overall operations of the organization. To ensure organizational accountability, the AEMS Board of Governors, Executive Committee, and Executive Director regularly meet and communicate. During 2018-19, six Board meetings and six Executive Committee meetings were held.

**Financial Accountability** The AEMS Board of Governors is charged with ensuring that the financial resources of AEMS are properly and efficiently safeguarded, maintained, and used. The Board is also responsible for adopting management practices that foster and support the long-term sustainability of the organization. To uphold the organization's financial health and integrity, a contracted bookkeeper conducts a monthly review and reconciliation of AEMS' finances. Additionally, a financial review was conducted by Eckelberg and Wienshienk, PC, an independent certified public accounting firm.

**Volunteer Hours** Through planning, coordinating, implementing, and participating in various AEMS activities, volunteers contributed a conservatively estimated **2745 hours** during 2018-19.

**Education, Prevention, and Training** Education, training, prevention, and awareness activities are a cornerstone function of AEMS. During 2018-19, AEMS coordinated the 19<sup>th</sup> Annual EMS Odyssey Conference. Additionally, AEMS coordinated six Functional Group meetings which averaged approximately 50 participants. Advocacy is crucial to the AEMS' mission as well as for its service to the State of Arizona. **EMS Odyssey Main Event** AEMS successfully implemented the 19th Annual EMS Odyssey Conference held June 13-14, 2019 at the Desert Willow Conference Center in Phoenix. Over 200 participants were in attendance. This year, AEMS partnered with the Arizona Emergency Nurses Association (AZENA) to help coordinate several sessions and promote the conference.

Some of the main conference presentation topics included: weapons of mass destruction for medical professionals; traumatic amputations; legal and ethical issues facing EMS; stroke VAN assessment; first responder resilience; ventilators; opioids and EMS occupational exposure; basic x-ray interpretation; human trafficking; disaster search dogs; pediatric seizures; injury prevention; active shooter panel; and bullets and ballistics.

## PLANNING • COMMUNITY OUTREACH & RESOURCES • ADVOCACY

**RED Book (Regional EMS Directory)** The RED Book continues to serve as valuable resource tool for field EMS and trauma personnel. As a “living document,” the RED Book requires frequent updates and changes. The RED Book Committee, which is composed of the Valley Medical Directors group and other AEMS constituents, meets regularly to discuss current evidence-based science and re-evaluate current protocols for practicality, effectiveness, and scientific recommendations.

The focus during 2018-19 was to review the Triage, Treatment, and Transport Guidelines (aka T3Gs) adapted from the National Association of State EMS Officials (NASEMSO) Model EMS Clinical Guidelines published online in January 2019. AEMS representatives, in collaboration with the Valley Medical Directors, EMS ROCC, WEMSCOM, reviewed, discussed, and adapted the T3Gs to create the Central Region EMS Guidelines. The Central Arizona Regional EMS Guidelines will eventually replace the current content found in RED Book, Chapter 3.

**Categorization** The activities of the Categorization Committee during 2018-19 included:

- Reviewed and revised RED Book, Chapter 7, Categorization, including the questionnaire.
- The following facilities were categorized by AEMS:
  - Dignity Health Arizona General Hospital Mesa (October 2018)
  - MIHS Maryvale Hospital (now known as Valleywise Emergency-Maryvale).
- Updated Categorization matrix.

**Social Media and Website** AEMS continues to build and maintain its presence on the internet through our social media involvement and website. **Regional Emergency Medical Services Coordinating System Central Regional EMS Council for the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS)** On behalf of the State of Arizona, AEMS serves as the Regional Emergency Medical Services Coordinating System for the Central Arizona Region. AEMS continues to have a productive and successful partnership with ADHS and maintains representation on and active involvement with numerous state committees and initiatives concerned with EMS, trauma, disaster preparedness, stroke, pediatric, community paramedicine, and other pertinent issues.

**National First Responder Course Evaluation** Texas A&M Engineering and Extension Service (TEEX) requested AEMS support with identifying a select group of first responders to evaluate a new national course and curriculum on Medical Preparedness and Response for Bombing Incidents. This two-day (16 hours) evaluation event, held in May 2019, was a collaborative venture among AEMS, Arizona Trauma Association (AzTracc), and TEEX. On behalf of AEMS, Sandy Nygaard took the lead in helping identify 30 participants representing, fire, EMS, FBI, Pinal County Sheriff’s Office, Maricopa County Sheriff’s Office, and Phoenix Police. On behalf of AzTracc, Joseph Sucher, MD, also an AEMS Board Member, assisted with the coordination and evaluation.
